Coming soon: Apply for I-CUREUS and SaPP

Help provide Carleton students with the opportunity to participate in undergraduate research or to partner on course design. Applications for <u>I-CUREUS and Students</u> as <u>Partners Program (SaPP)</u> will open October 7, with decisions on successful applications being communicated in early November.

<u>I-CUREUS</u>: Provides an opportunity for undergraduate students to conduct paid research and gain hands-on experience in their discipline or area of interest. Internships may span from November 2024 to April 2025 for a maximum of 150 hours.

<u>SaPP</u>: Offers instructors and learning support staff the opportunity to involve undergraduate students in teaching innovation and curriculum design through paid work

experience. Students can partner on a variety of projects to support upcoming courses or teaching and learning initiatives.

Instructors are encouraged to apply for any upcoming courses (in Winter, Summer, or Fall 2025 term), but projects must be completed before the course starts.



Embedding Indigenous Ways of Knowledge in Your Teaching

The Higher Education Quality Council of Ontario (HEQCO) recently released a new handbook created by the Negahneewin Research Centre at Confederation College. The Indigenous Knowledge Implementation Packsack: A Handbook for Embedding Indigenous Ways of Knowing in Your Teaching is a resource to support postsecondary instructors addresses instructors' anxieties about incorporating Indigenous Knowledges into their teaching practice.

In addition to the above handbook, Carleton's Office of Indigenous Teaching, Learning and Research provides leadership guidance, support and resources to instructors, including a suite of Collaborative Indigenous Learning Bundles. Conceived by Dr. Kahente Horn-Miller, Bundles are both a resource for instructors and a learning tool for students to use in the classroom. Bundles provide the necessary factual and theoretical basis for understanding Indigenous history and politics in Canada, while also prompting students to consider how this knowledge might be applied in their area of study. Each Bundle, produced and delivered by Indigenous experts, is formatted as a Brightspace lesson, addressing issues and topics relevant to Indigenous peoples.

Dr. Horn-Miller will be hosting a <u>Bundles Community of Practice</u> on Oct 29 from 10:30 to noon for instructors currently integrating the Bundles into course and for those of you who are interested in learning more about them. Register <u>here</u> to participate.

This Community of Practice discussion is an opportunity for instructors to reflect on their experience integrating a

Bundle into their teaching, to prepare to teach with a Bundle, and to learn from colleagues' experiences who have already incorporated Bundles.

TLS Temporary Program Suspensions:

In light of recent budget reductions, TLS will be suspending or reducing several of its programs until further notice.

- Carleton University Experiential Learning Fund (CUELF): There will be no call for proposals in 2024/25.
- Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL) Grant:
 Applications will not be accepted for 2024/25.
- Teaching Development Grant: Applications will not be accepted for 2024/25.
- Carleton University Chair in Teaching Innovation: This award has been officially retired as of 2024.

The Students as Partners (SaPP) and the Internship-Carleton University Research Experience for Undergraduate Students (I-CUREUS) programs will continue at a diminished funding level. See the lead article in the newsletter for the application deadlines for these programs.

Despite these changes, TLS remains committed to exploring alternative funding options. We will actively seek partnerships with community organizations and charitable entities to identify new funding models and restore these programs in the future.
